Size and Landscape

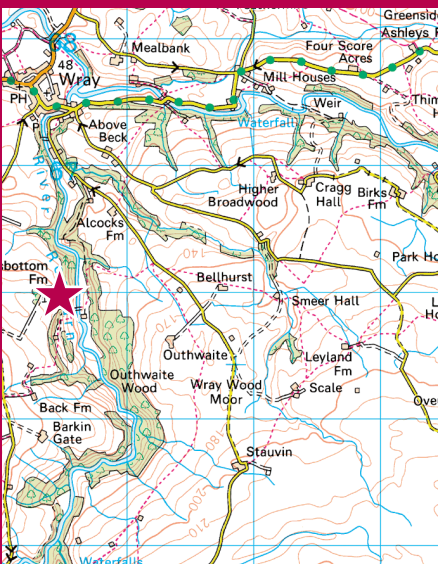
- 📍 100 hectares of farmland
- 📍 Semi-natural woodland, wildflower meadows and orchards
- 📍 Ponds, hedgerows, woodland, forest garden and river/streams
- 📍 Extends from open moorland to wooded valley
- 📍 Excellent panoramic views across the Lune valley to Yorkshire and Cumbria

Farming Type

- 📍 Run organically with Lleyn sheep
- 📍 Organic fruit
- 📍 Free range poultry

- ◊ General field studies – sensory themes
- ◊ Celebration of the seasons

Brief History

- ◊ The farm and land used to be part of the Hornby Castle Estate and was used for breeding and shooting pheasants
- ◊ In the 18th & 19th centuries the woodlands were used to produce cart wheels, tools, baskets and coffins, providing a sustainable resource for local populations
- ◊ In 1968 a huge flood washed away the original farmhouse and buildings



Conservation on the Farm

- ◊ Restoration of old orchards and conservation of traditional local varieties
- ◊ Farmland managed to organic standards
- ◊ One of the largest and best examples of native woodland in Lancashire
- ◊ Wildflower hay meadow improvement
- ◊ Programme of hedge laying



Farm Walks

- ◊ Woodland, meadow and moorland walks available – led by the farmer
- ◊ Terrain can be steep and difficult for those less able however, distances are tailored to suit school needs



Farm Projects

- ◊ Fruit tree nursery – growing grafted traditional Lancashire apple varieties
- ◊ Middlewood Trust – provides a study centre to promote environmental courses addressing the growing concern about long term damage to the environment
- ◊ Timber extraction and use as part of woodland management for wildlife
- ◊ Roeburndale Camping Barn
